PETER GÄRDENFORS

<u>PRESENTATION I</u> – with Josef Quitterer <u>PANTOMIME AS A FOUNDATION FOR RITUAL</u> <u>AND LANGUAGE</u>

BIO: Peter Gärdenfors is senior professor of Cognitive Science at Lund University, Sweden. His main research interests are concept formation, semantics of natural angle and the evolution of cognition and language. Three of his main books are Conceptual Spaces (MIT Press 2000), How Homo Become Sapiens (Oxford University Press 2003), and Geometry of Meaning (MIT Press 2014).

ABSTRACT: This article aims at tracing the evolutionary roots of rituals. My main thesis is that rituals have emerged as conventionalizations of pantomimes. The original function of pantomime is for teaching. In that function, pantomime derives from demonstration. My focus in this article is on rituals that produce group identification. Like pantomime, rituals signify meaning beyond the actual actions. Like demonstration and pantomime, ritual is a tool for learning. What is learnt is system of beliefs that become shared within a society. Such shared beliefs strengthen the cohesion within a society. Ritual and language have partly different functions. One function of ritual is to promote long-term cooperation, while language primarily coordinates action.



JOSEF QUITTERER

<u>PRESENTATION I</u> – with Peter Gärdenfors <u>SPECIFIC COGNITIVE PRESUMPTIONS OF LITURGICAL</u> <u>PRACTICES</u>

BIO: Josef Quitterer did his studies in Philosophy and Theology in Regensburg and Rome, 1994 PhD (Philosophy) at the Gregorian University, Rome; 2001 Habilitation in Philosophy (Theol. Faculty, University of Innsbruck); since 2001 he has been Associate Professor at the Dept. of Christian Philosophy - University of Innsbruck and since 2017 Dean of the School of Catholic Theology - University of Innsbruck; visiting professorships in Frankfurt, Rome and New Orleans; his main focus of research: Philosophy of Mind, Philosophical Anthropology (book on the 'self', several articles on mental causation and human responsibility), Philosophy of Science.



ABSTRACT: (Quitterer) According to Peter Gärdenfors, rituals produce group identification by creating "a system of shared beliefs, in particular concerning causal relations, within a society". In my paper I explore how Gärdenfors' thesis can be applied to specific liturgical practices. My thesis is that rituals and performative speech acts in Christian liturgy presuppose shared intentions of all participants of the liturgical event. Even if there are different roles in liturgy (priest, 'normal' believers), there is no clear asymmetry between 'performers' and 'followers'. Liturgy as a shared activity of performers with common intentions requires an adaption of Gärdenfors' understanding of rituals as tools of learning.



THOMAS POTT

PRESENTATION II EXPLORING THE EDGES OF SACRAMENTALITY: LITURGY BETWEEN THE REALITY OF LIFE AND THE TRUTH OF FAITH

BIO: Thomas Pott, monk of the Benedictine Monastery of Chevetogne, teaches Oriental Liturgy and Byzantine Theology of Sacraments at the Pontifical Oriental Institute and the Pontifical Atheneum Sant'Anselmo in Rome. He wrote his doctoral thesis on the History of Reform of Byzantine Liturgy.

ABSTRACT: More than a hundred years after the beginning of the Liturgical Movement, the concept of mysterion — in which sacraments, sacramentality and liturgy constitute an organic and original harmony - does not seem to have sufficiently penetrated theological and liturgical mentalities. so that 'reform' of liturgical piety, on the one hand, and the comprehension of the role of sacraments in the life of the Church, on the other hand, is realized. With the aid of examples taken mostly from the Byzantine liturgical tradition. this paper intends to present a vision of sacramentality in which sacraments reflect the reality of life and the truth of faith.





ELBATRINA CLAUTEAUX

<u>PRESENTATION III</u> THE PRINCIPLE SACRAMENTALITY: REVELATION OF THE DIVINITY AND THE HUMANITY OF GOD

BIO: Elbatrina Clauteaux born in Venezuela (South America), married widow, three children and seven grandchildren, anthropologist and philosopher of formation, doctor of theology, teaches basic theology at the Catholic Institute of Paris Theologicum. Her research focuses on the "meta function", hermeneutics, symbol, metaphor, narrative, ritual, narrative identity, mediation, play.

ABSTRACT: The anthropological observation of the religious practices of the Pémon wisdom of the Venezuelan Amazon reveals the presence of mediations of immanent and transcendent transcendence (symbols, narratives, rites). This anthropological invariant, belonging to man's way of being, an expression of his openness to the common, ambient, and divine world, is played out in the sacramental Christianity between creation and salvation. Rupture and or continuity of symbolism, of sacrality, how and why?



JANET WALTON

PRESENTATION IV – joint presentation by Janet Walton and Cláudio Carvalhaes SACRAMENTS AND GLOBAL REALITIES

BIO: Janet R. Walton is Professor Emerita of Worship at Union Theological Seminary in New York, NY. Her research and teaching focus on ritual traditions and practices in religious communities with particular interest in artistic dimensions, feminist perspectives and commitments to justice. Her books include *Worship and Art: A Vital Connection, Sacred Sound and Social Change*, co-edited with Lawrence Hoffman, *Women at Worship: Interpretations of North American Diversity* co-edited with Marjorie Procter-Smith, *Feminist Liturgy: A Matter of Justice* and a volume of Liturgy: *New and Borrowed Rites* co-edited with Siobhan Garrigan. She is currently writing a book on worship beyond boundaries.





CLÁUDIO CARVALHAES

BIO: Rev. Dr. Cláudio Carvalhaes is originally from São Paulo, Brazil. He did his studies in Brazil and in United States, receiving his PhD at the Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He has taught at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia and McCormick Presbytery in Chicago. He is now the Associate Professor of Worship at Union Theological Seminary. He was a pastor for 10 years in Brazil and United States, working with poor and undocumented people. He is a teaching elder at the Presbyterian Church, USA, He is the author of 3 books in Portuguese and his books in English are: Sacraments and Globalization: Redrawing the Borders of Eucharistic Hospitality (Wipf and Stock, Pickwick Publications, 2013); Liturgy in Postcolonial Perspectives— Only One Is Holy. Ed. Cláudio Carvalhaes (New York: Palgrave Macmillan, 2015). Post-colonialism and Religions Series, and What Worship Has to Do With It: Interpreting Life, Church and the World Liturgically (Oregon: Cascade Books, 2017). www.claudiocarvalhaes.com

ABSTRACT: When we think about our liturgical practices, what forms of life are we practicing in worship? How do our practices respond to the challenges of the world? What do we affirm and stand for? What boundaries do we cross, expand, transform? What awareness, courage, and delight do our prayers bring forth? How does the eucharist matter to a world going desperately hungry? What does baptism mean to communities who die drinking the water or from washing in it? What roles do sacraments play in politically divided communities? Where is God, now?

In this presentation we will invite each other to stumble together, looking into the corners of traditions, seeing them emerge with layers of imagination and doing as lenses for sacramental practicing that matters, now, this day, this year, differently and connected.





KWABENA ASAMOAH-GYADU

PRESENTATION V SIGNS, TOKENS AND POINTS OF CONTACT: RELIGIOUS SYMBOLISM AND SACRAMENTALITY IN NON-WESTERN CHRISTIANITY

BIO: J. Kwabena Asamoah-Gyadu FGA, PhD (Birmingham, UK, 2000), Fellow of the Ghana Academy of Arts and Sciences is Baëta-Grau Professor of Contemporary African Christianity and Pentecostal/Charismatic theology at the Trinity Theological Seminary, Legon, Ghana. He has researched and written extensively on contemporary Christianity in Africa, Christianity and healing, and Pentecostalism including African immigrant churches in both Europe and North America.

ABSTRACT: This paper examines "sacramentalism" and its accompanying popular liturgical rituals in non-Western Christianity, particularly focusing on developments in Africa. The Next Christendom by P. Jenkins and Beyond Christendom by J.H. Hanciles are just two of the most important works that explain the historical developments of Christianity's move from the northern to the southern continents, at least in terms of active participation and statistics. It thereby generated changes that distinguish it from the expressions of faith inherited from the West. Christian religious innovation and new ways of expressing the faith have become the hallmarks of African Christianity. One way in which these religious changes are discernible is the use of "signs and tokens," i.e., physical substances that in the hands of religious functionaries acquire a sacramental value and that serve e.g. as support to ministries associated with Pentecostal/charismatic churches. An example of these new sacramental substances is the widespread use of oil for anointing. While not new in the historic Christian traditions, the use of oil for anointing in contemporary African Christianity has been reinvented and instituted in healing and deliverance and exorcism rituals that clearly go beyond what was familiar in the older religious traditions. In this paper, I will reflect on new sacraments which are re-designated as "signs and tokens" and used as therapeutic substances in contemporary forms of African Christianity. This approach will help us understand what non-Western Christians, through popular religious innovations, consider important in a faith whose liturgical standards were originally set by Western missionaries.





LIEVEN BOEVE

PRESENTATION VI SYMBOLS OF WHO WE ARE CALLED TO BECOME: SACRAMENTS IN A POST-SECULAR AND POST-CHRISTIAN SOCIETY

BIO: Lieven Boeve is Professor of Fundamental Theology at the Faculty of Theology and Religious Studies, KU Leuven, Belgium. As of August 1, 2014, he has been appointed Directorgeneral of the Flemish Office for Catholic Education. Among others, he is the author of *Lyotard and Theology: Beyond the* Christian Master narrative of Love (London/ New York: Bloomsbury T&T Clark, 2014) and Theology at the Crossroads of University, Church and Society: Dialogue, Difference and Catholic Identity (London: Bloomsbury, 2016). On September 17, 2015, the European Society for Catholic Theology awarded him an important prize for his book Lyotard and Theology. From 2008 till 2014 he served as Dean of his Faculty; from 2005 till 2009 he was the international president of the European Society of Catholic Theology. On October 1, 2015, he was appointed Honorary Professor of Australian Catholic University.

ABSTRACT: This paper concerns the relation between Christian faith and the post-secular and post-Christian context in Europe, particularly the place of the sacraments therein. I first analyze how the present-day Western-European context can be considered post-Christian and post-secular, a situation resulting from the social processes of detraditionalisation, individualisation and pluralisation. I will highlight the changed way in which individual and communal identities are constructed. Secondly, I show how this analysis assists us in reflecting on the way in which sacraments function as identity markers, thus being symbols of what people are. In the third section, I develop a cultural-theological argument that sacraments are not only 'symbols of who we are', but especially also 'symbols of who we are called to become'. In the fourth and final section, I provide a fundamental-theological background of this argument, demonstrating how a dialogue with contemporary philosophies of difference offers thoughtful criticisms of our theological understandings of God's love and helps us reconsider divine love in non-totalitarian and liberating ways. The category of interruption, which enables one to think beyond the opposites of continuity and discontinuity, will play a key role.
